

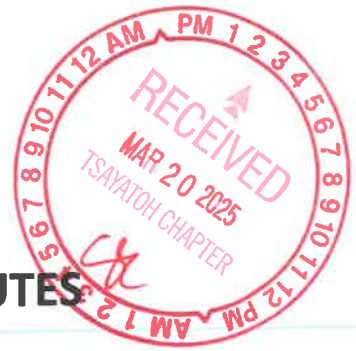

DRAFT SPECIAL MEETING MINUTES

9:00AM • Thursday, March 13, 2025

Becenti Chapter Veterans Center • Becenti, New Mexico



- I. **CHAPTER ROLL CALL** — ENAC Vice President Ida M. Nelson 18 Chapters present
- II. **CALL TO ORDER** — ENAC President Johnny Johnson at 9:15 am
 - A. Invocation — Jonathan Perry, President, Becenti Chapter.
 - B. Opening Remarks — ENAC President Johnson explained this special meeting is due to concerns expressed during the Quarterly Meeting. Jonathan Perry noted the two names for the community, have 856 registered voters, 1,100 population, noted the work on CERT and have CLUP, advised of the new Veterans Building completed within 1 ½ year, community named after former leader Becenti.
 - C. Sergeant of Arms - Anita Benally & Dave Emerson. The floor given to Rainy Arviso — new supervisor for Crownpoint Service Unit CHR, making visit to chapters for user agreements, attend chapter meetings to see the need and have CHR be more involved. Hoskie Kee noted membership of the agreement with chapters, you do not tell the chapters what to do, made this recommendation to the chapters, should not mandate chapters.
- III. **REVIEW AND ADOPT AGENDA** — ENAC Vice President Nelson read the proposed agenda. JKP noted the revised language for resolution “D”, resolution read into the record. Young Jeff Tom noted the amount to be amended to \$3.3M for resolution “A” and \$3.8M for resolution “B”. Kee Hoskie requested after presentation for Uranium to add BIE Executive Order impact under B and action item to be discussed first since the purpose of the Special Meeting is to discuss the Action Items. Johnny noted the importance of the Uranium presentation as well. .

- IV. **PRESENTATION**
 - A. **Uranium Waste Transport** • Stephen Etsitty, Executive Director—NN Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) concerns expressed topic President—in general Uranium Transport several things happening, other important plan in the coming years, active transport going on, Quivera planned, Mac/Black Jack — Mariano Lake AUM transport planned, others mentioned were Crownpoint & Church Rock, Energy Fuels Company own a mine south of Grand Canyon, Kaibab National Forest, during the 70's discussion began, environmental impact statement completed 1980s — NN participated in Environment Impact Statement (EIS), 1986 EIS approved, included mining operation plan and transportation routes, company owns the mine and the mill, active mill — Blanding UT, transportation approved, 2012 impact statement — Dine Protection Act involved, activities in Church Rock, enacted Transportation Act to restrict use of NN roads from transporting uranium, new NN laws mining and transportation still approved, understand price of uranium - \$20/lb., 2023 - \$50.00/lb., Jan 2024 — over \$100/lb., snooping in Crownpoint area, today \$64/lb., noted it is just about money to the industry, proposed route uses network of highways from mine site to mill site, State Highway Grand Canyon to Williams, US 89/160/191, 50s NN granted ROW, use for broad of commerce such as propane, gasoline and other chemicals, difficult to stop transport of uranium, challenged in court, asked why not challenging other chemicals, regulate only one? Told being too selective, happening underground mine pulling up natural oil, low grade low specific activity, mining operation 28 month period, December 2023 to 2 ½ years, 2 trucks a day, telling us 6-8 trucks per day, now 3 trucks, copy of highlights and fact sheets, 11 different documents, to be sent by JKP via email, limiting M-F, after 8:30 pm, out by 3 pm, unload at the mill, come to reservation without restriction, agreement can be inspected, inspect every day, check truck documents, radiological scan, doing good meeting them daily, decision not to haul — federal holidays, 10 other days, blackout days, lot of activities on transport route, July 4th activities in Kayenta, Tuba City Fair in October, weather related — no haul day, Thursday and Friday, feel a different and better way than lawsuit, potential for lost of sovereignty, to NNEPA \$1.2M safety and operation, not enough for past harm, initial one time pay, monthly amount based on amount of transportation 50 per month, 2026 budget — 10 chapters along haul route, emergency preparedness, Emergency Response Team, company primary responsible, spill — company responsible, safety clean — work with Police Department — have experience, limit driving per day, system truck operation, indicators go off at office, more transport coming down the way, look at this radioactive regulated ore, abandon uranium mine — waste material still radioactive, some sites will be the

same or more, get ready for other transports, developing remote technology monitor in real time on a truck, using a mobile detection device, satellite system – going to NN office, still 6 months to 1 year off, 3-5 years before transport starts happening, starting 2027 – Quivera mine waste transport has to get permits from NM and design the facility that could take 3-5 years, earliest 3 years from now. Fran George asked how NDOT is involved, reply that coordination with Police District, heard of highway problems, erosion highlighted to NDOT, Katie Hobbs gave time to NN to work with companies, also need to communicate with ADOT, keeping Tom Platero updated for maintenance, support for inspection station in Cameron, AZ, in Eastern seen the proposed transport from Quivera to Thoreau, still years off, Smith Lake and Mariano Lake chapters have 7 abandoned uranium mines, consolidate to create a repository, - Mac one, transport on Old Gulf Mine Road, allotment issues, general ROW issues, ENLC are the primary for advocacy for land issues and allottee rights, Quivera we know EPA can do a better job, new development with treatment technology – another alternative for all these sites, in our view reduce all the transport, high pressure slurry ablation – treatment that can be used now, process in testing it, selecting a site, contract before the summer and complete before the calendar year, Blanding facility – White Mesa Mill only operating uranium processing mill, includes radioactive waste material from Europe to this facility, also from Japan, materials coming from all sides, alternative feed material, neighbors Ute Mountain south of the Mill fighting to close the mill, not been successful, not have operating, can stop it but manage, explore technology, price of uranium always a factor, recycling undesirable but still has enough of the decay product, Radium 226 – interested in recovering the waste by federal government, may be more attractive, NN mine waste, exploring, Energy Fuels (EF) asking NN for the last 5 years, to take some of your mine waste, 5,000 ton but no action, now NN is listening, coming back to NN, meeting with leaders, approached RDC, meeting set on transport issue in August but July 30 a conflict arose so meeting was cancelled, shows EF agrees to take 10,000T at their expense, DISA and EF, US geological survey, other parts of federal government, federal mining dialog, Dept of Energy, Department of Defense, EPA, and other state programs, domestic uranium instead of getting from Russia, Laramine now in the picture as reported, New Fuels – approach by knocking at our door, interested in the Church Rock, Section 8 and 17, keeping them away from private land, Alva Tom advised if allottee can be covered by Senator Tsosie, the response was, yes, US and Canada with current tariff issue – waiting for NN. Kenneth Toledo commented downwinder from everything, “Yeeyah”, transportation discussed but did not go over the responsibility, liability, what is covered in the event of an accident, what about the public and the environment, noted no guarantee of safety, mines have been closed still dangerous present and yet to come, no information on aquifer impact, nothing is ever safe. Hoskie Kee spoke on the black out days, asked who pays for the cleanup and accident, road closures, is there a plan for local shelter available, asked if transportation route allowed to stop for meal in Kayenta, what caused uranium cost to go up. Stephen Etsitty noted he does know of the price of uranium but noted the demand for nuclear energy, supply & demand, price an international agreement under the United Nation – Climate Change, noted they are able to stop transport, company are responsible, if NN spends money the cost recovery takes place, if incident were to occur, there are challenges, at the lower end of activity, a lot of radioactive research, time, shielding and distance, police control traffic, noted to stay at the site and create distance of 75 feet. Jonathan Perry noted Point of Privilege, the information on Mt. Taylor mining was requested. Stephen Etsitty noted they will receive these development proposals, target LaJara Mesa with US Forestry Service – may shows the project site, 25-30 miles south of Milan, off the mountain to Milan with destination of White Mesa Mill, NEPA process this are just coming up, Forestry to make the decisions, again noted not going to go away. Carol Daye asked how do we explain this to our community. Ervin Chavez noted the report is regarding AZ and NM, see the concern of transporting, real concern is transport of closed drum, see it on Highway 550, advised to place in a tube sealed shut to transport, contents blowing out during transport, advised the Anglos are 100 years ahead of us, need safer transport. Anita Benally inquired on transport of the Quivera mine waste, opposing the transport to Thoreau but supporting clean up not the transport. Stephen started need for discussion that is basic, other resources talking about to the uranium all the way around, again mentioned the 1986 and 2012 EIS already approved, need for changed of EIS, learned DOT regulations, faced with EPA decision press release January 7, first time included NN in the report but EPA makes the decision, include NN in the headline as if this was agreed upon by both entities, still have a lot of issues, such as allottees, and ROW, noted the December 2, meeting to get with BIA and NN, noted the unresolved issues, expected another follow up, but December 17 with President Nygren for 30 minute update, he wants faster and sooner resolution, January 7 – USEPA and NN and February 20 meeting but not happy with cutting this short, President to challenge to revisit White Mesa and ablation, now they are listening, have time since permitting and design use that time to come up with a better way, how will we address this, treatment technology end result makes the waste hard to get in ground water, stripping more sand and gravel, 2 piles of material, less of threat to ground water, wherever it is taken, no one wants the uranium waste in their backyard, 2 in UT and 1 in CO, noted 523 abandoned mines on NN, overall there are 15,000. Leonard Tsosie advised as leaders to take these issues seriously and provide information to the membership, pay attention to the EE/CA, be involved, they believe no one will show up, engineering study doing their plans, they state there

are no comments from NN, as leaders take this seriously as there are changing times, Stephen Etsitty is our expert. Lucy Antone reported a truck tipped over in their area, finally made it home, plans being noted, asked why other chapters do not know like during the train derailment, trucks can make potholes, think as a chapter we are not ready no emergency plans, have to be taught training at the chapter level, do the CSC know, if a person is herding sheep, how will we help them, especially elders. Leonard Tsosie noted accidents will not wait for us. Lucy advised if an incident occurs on a Friday and chapter house is closed, there would be no information. Leonard Tsosie advised to set yourself up for these communication, noted over 800 meeting and we get paid stipend, noted the Lupton route, NN said no for transportation, the road thickness is essential, can ruin the road, state road used, same situation at Counselor and Torreon, accidents are bound to happen, noted the accidents on I-40 road, plans to make this a six lane road advised to talk with Lundstrom, noted during accidents and road closures, Navajos take side road, trucks take side roads, see trucks on Alamo dirt road. Johnny Johnson noted the chapter officials are responsible for ensuring emergency plans are available. Ida Nelson reported the Tucson Electric has electric line, they have POO, RDC and B&F meeting on March 26, noted this is a large powerline, NN provided agreement and was paid only \$30,000, the allottees not mentioned or considered, asked for resolution for all resolutions to resources, human and environment is changing but this is not being informed of, noted the Church Rock families that passed on, no one doing anything, noted her young niece but impacted, noted to tell your community members, brought out the trees at Mariano Lake are dead, including wildlife and insects, we know this is due to the climate change, noted the issues with the large powerline that it makes loud constant noise, told to bring this information to your membership, asked Delegate Yazzie about the allocation of half of the FY 25 budget, he noted it is not President Nygren doing this, noted the budget was signed but the Speaker rescinded her name, feels like we are weak not doing anything, need to make sure our people are taken care of it, noted if an emergency happens she began to think of outlet for Highway 602 if something should happen, noted it makes you think and cautious, noted we have to get wise, acknowledge the former delegates. Johnny Johnson noted of the new POO, not dictated to that we are able to take local matters into consideration, can take care of ourself, will establish committees and executive council, looking at ASC and LGSC comparison, then advised to get on the agenda early. Rita Capitan noted the issues with President and VP, not acknowledging VP, leave it to VP to represent while she is not recognized, asked for all the resolution, is Buu Nygren going to let her take the resolution to its resource, place President and VP on leave, asked who is in leadership, resolution at the end of December, where is the resolution, where is the action being taken, how do we handle it when there is no VP, legally DOJ or someone has to give us advise, US and other countries have President and VP, who is in charge when President is in Las Vegas. Johnny Johnson quoted from Facebook NNC is the governing body, others are AG, NNC has the authority, they are not taking action, what else do we do. Leonard Tsosie noted NNC has the authority, advised of 2 avenues signatures for the recall and NNC action, advised may create a split, advised just come back together as Agency and work through our people, advised he does know this is not what you do not want to hear, announced meeting on March 21, ENLC discussion regarding Nageezi Chapter, Huerfano and Pinedale Chapters, Navajo people living on BLM land and wanting to get electricity. Need the list, to give to NN. Ida Nelson noted the task given to George Tolth but did not happen, give the letter him again, need update report, next meeting at Alamo ask President to come to our meeting in person, due process has to happen.

- B. BIE – Executive Order impact** Hoskie Kee – EO from President – report 5-10 minutes – Section 1 – read due to parents want the best education for their children, asked to make this report a part of the resolution. Woodward noted this is an important subject, Eastern Agency worked hard with schools and chapters to construct 7 new schools, changes in reorganization confused everyone, hear these questions, need to pay attention to education side, Trump spoke cutting down funding of education, told everyone will have to give up something from their program, less students and more employees – RIF, see if this is happening, school with less than 100 students are considered to close down, Treaty is there, positions are being reviewed, ask if anyone is inquiring on position, if position is necessary, reported to Sec. of Interior – has 90 days to report why to keep the schools open, asked what do you do within the 8 hours each day, submit report at the end of the week, for an educator should not be a problem, since they have lesson plans, some schools are being reviewed and RIF or replacing them elsewhere, advocacy for school, advised schools belong to you because that is where your children go to school, not sure of grant schools, wrote Sec of Interior, noted her response was using the Baca School, she has been to all the schools, already have bureau operated, students attend school close to home, addresses choice parents already made those choices, Sec. of Interior look at it, point out to him we already have the funding ICEP in the federal funding for each school, have system with everything in it, education part to every school board member told them to read and they will work with this, President Trump said he is doing this because of scores of 8th grader that cannot read, students not moving forward, her opinion is he is right, layer of offices, reorganization in Window Rock was a crying shame, they took all the agency, southside people closer to them, all people at the agency moved to Gallup area, no consultation with anyone, best people in our agency and tell you why they are there, dismantled Special Ed, Specialist, Larry Holman had us do good things, took offices in Shiprock, Special Ed

in Chinle, some offices in WR, Gallup shut down Baca so was homeless, went to WR, Director – strategic direction schools are following that coming from top down, administrative is top heavy, must wait your turn, communication with WR is none, only when they have meeting always you will, struggled with the new board. Clara Daye noted used to test students with WFD, most high in math, reading and language is low, issue with youth filling application, like that all over, her recommendation is to go back to the basic, go back to your chapter for resolution to oppose this Executive Order. The advise was to go back to your chapter, Head Start impacted as well, a review without an advance notice, McKinley County schools going to be impacted, all schools as well, Kenneth Toledo noted per EO # 2, they will give you vouchers to attend school but not at the school you are at, or get away from BIA and go elsewhere, noted his position is to oppose this whole movement which is taking away 700 jobs worth over \$700M, parental involvement issues, noted this includes state public school with Impact Aid and JOM programs, noted administrators will be cut off, asked for resolution opposing EO#14191. JKP noted the report not accepted due to the lack of quorum.

V. ACTION ITEM – Resolutions

A. ENAC 03-2025-013: REQUESTING AND RECOMMENDING THE 25TH NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL TO APPROPRIATE \$3,300,000 FROM THE UNRESERVED UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE (UUFb) TO FUND THE SUMMER YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (SYEP), WITH THE FUNDS DISTRIBUTED AMONG THE 110 NAVAJO CHAPTERS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025

Young Jeff Tom advised of the request for this resolution to NNC for additional funds for SYEP, noted he spent \$48.00 on the prints for this resolution since he was told by chapter administrator they are not his supervisor, NNC will look at this and need 16 votes, if approved each chapter to get \$30,000, have to do budget as well before we send to NNC. Clara Daye noted an amendment not just for FY 25 but to be recurring and included annually, noted of the previous time when received funds at the 12th hour was difficult in getting supplies for student projects, asked why Council Delegates are doing this separately, motion / second Alva Tom to make this recurring. Hoskie Kee noted this is a separate issue, due to the Appropriation Act that needs to be changed by NNC, noted this resolution is for additional funds. Anita Benally advised this is for our community, we know the needs, noted the current balances of some of the chapters remaining with high balances, rural communities have less resources, advised of a possible raise in hourly wage, options on how to use the funds. Young Jeff Tom advised of the amendment separately, will be out of order if the amendments are included, 32 hours for under 18, 40 hours for over 18, asked for withdrawal of the amendment, otherwise to vote this down. Johnny Johnson noted this resolution is being requested with the existing CR, noted the recurring may be requested in June meeting. Lucita Nolan noted at the chapter these fund allocations have policies and unable to have students employed, place on the agenda but told policy states, asked to amend the policy, advised if funds are allocated to limit the policies (separate issue). Wanda Arviso inquired with YJT, if FY 2025 approved by NNC, giving to OPVP, over \$900,000 allocated for SYEP in the current comprehensive budget, asked if this \$30,000 will be requesting an additional \$30,000 evenly. YJT noted the confusion, CR approved for FY 24-25, rest for up to September, have not received the copy yet and do not know what the President will do, UUFb already has funds, asking for distribution of the 50/50 formula. Clara Daye noted this is confusing, already in the comprehensive, agreed to withdraw amendment but want it in June to be sponsored by YJT. Alva agreed to withdraw as well. 37 in favor, 0 oppose, 0 abstain Directive – amendment in June meeting.

B. ENAC 03-2025-014: REQUESTING AND RECOMMENDING THE 25TH NAVAJO NATION COUNCIL TO ALLOCATE \$35,000,000 FROM THE UNRESERVED UNDESIGNATED FUND BALANCE (UUFb) TO SUPPORT THE CHAPTER PUBLIC EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM (PEP) FOR FISCAL YEAR 2025, WITH DISTRIBUTION TO EACH OF THE 110 NAVAJO CHAPTERS

Young Jeff Tom to correct the amount to \$3,850,000 at \$35,000 per 110 chapters, asking for support for PEP funds, note we used to have snow, the livestock owners would benefit, the media announcement for 10-day employment, noted chapters are under legislative branch, chapter employee are under the Executive branch, noted the need to prepare for the summer, Washington DC talking about Treaty, Medicare and Social Security and unknown what will happen. Hoskie Kee added we need to add language the funds shall not lapse at the end of the fiscal year. Brenda Holgate noted in the appropriation, chapter funds do not lapse, advised of Appendix M with the BIM.

- C. ENAC 03-2025-015: SUPPORTING THE TSE'II'AHÍ CHAPTERS' APPLICATION TO THE TRIBAL INFRASTRUCTURE FUND (TIF) FOR \$10,000,000 TO PLAN, DESIGN, AND CONSTRUCT THE TSE'II'AHÍ EXTENSION OF THE BECON-BITSI-N9 (BBN9) & 371 CORRIDOR PROJECT-NAVAJO GALLUP WATER SUPPLY PROJECT (NGWSP). THIS PROJECT REPRESENTS THE FIRST PHASE OF THE LARGER MULTI-PHASED BBN9 REGIONAL PROJECT, WHICH WILL SERVE TWELVE RURAL NAVAJO COMMUNITIES**

Coyote Canyon, Tse'ii'ahi, *Nahodishgish*, Crownpoint, Becenti, Lake Valley, White Rock, Littlewater, Casamero Lake, Smith Lake, Baca/Prewitt, and Thoreau

Johnny Johnson noted this resolution was approved for \$9.3 from the Capital Outlay for the Gallup Navajo Water Supply for the additional chapters, noted 2 projects in one, transport to barrel which is the supply water, pipes to home is distribution, not included was Baca, Thoreau, Casamero Lake and Iyanbito, water line from Iyanbito, funding from Bureau of Reclamation supply line, NM and NN, had hearings, senators deferred to TIF and increased the amount to \$10M, need to add Iyanbito. Jerry Bodie noted Casamero Lake is not included in the resolution (motion – Jerry Bodie to add Casamero Lake) (second Robinson Tom). Brenda noted the resolution states Tse ii ahi but should list all the chapters, noted that would be more appropriate. Johnny Johnson noted to make the correction to list all the chapters including Iyanbito Chapter. VOTES: 43 in favor, 0 oppose, 0 abstain

- D. ENAC 03-2025-016: REAFFIRMING THE UNITED STATES' TREATY OBLIGATIONS TO THE NAVAJO NATION AND RECOGNIZING THE UNIQUE STATUS OF INDIAN TRIBES AS SOVEREIGN NATIONS, ASSERTING THAT INDIAN TRIBES ARE NOT SUBJECT TO THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION'S FEBRUARY 14, 2025 'DEAR COLLEAGUE' LETTER REGARDING POLITICAL CLASSIFICATION**

Ervin Chavez BIA-BIE operated schools, NN does not have input at the local level, BIE operated school facing issues, BIA funded schools are okay but may be hit the following year, noted the Treaty, Department of Education reported 21,000 people let go, Elon Musk does not understand the Treaty, asking NN Government to make statement, NBOSBA president was told the state government to take over education, advised the federal government left out in the Treaty, Article 6 US has the obligation to provide education. YJT noted the resolution to take the word Draft out. Hoskie Kee asked for amendment by Ervin Chavez. Vicky Wellito seconded the motion. Sandra Help noted she has a draft copy and need the correct resolution, vote for amendment in 42 in favor, 0 oppose, 0 abstain. Fran George – Point of Privilege – asked if ENAC Chair votes, the response was, no, Chair does not vote, does not count as abstentions, vote only in case of a tie.
